EchoLink Now Available on 147.075 Repeater!

The Waynesboro Repeater Association of Virginia, which owns and operates the 147.075 repeater, is currently hosting an experimental connection to ECHOLINK, a way of connecting the repeater to the Internet. Listen in from 8:00 pm to 10:00 pm Monday through Friday or from 10:00am – 6:00pm on Saturday and Sunday. Work some DX from your HT or 2 meter mobile radio. Because this is a " linked -system", be sure to wait a few seconds before you transmit when you are in a QSO using this system.

If you have a real interest in ECHOLINK, just download the free (no-nag or ad) program and have fun that way too. K5KIP, N4JGO, and W4BLD are in charge of the project, which may soon become an integral part of the services offered to users of the .075 machine.


ECHOLINK is software that allows Amateur Radio stations to communicate with one another over the Internet, using voice-over-IP (VoIP) technology. The program allows worldwide connections to be

made between stations through RF, computer to station or from computer to computer. At present there are more than 37,000 registered users from all over the world. Yes, it is legal!

Below is a sample of what the log looks like once a licensed amateur downloads the program and places it in operation on a computer running Microsoft ™ Windows 95 or later. To download the program for use on your computer, go to WWW. ECHOLINK.ORG. Your call will be verified by ECHOLINK before you can have access to the system.

JT44 Mode Uses Ultra-Low Power for Long-Distance Contacts

This is some breaking news that was reported on Moon Net: "On Friday morning at South African moonset another 144 MHz EME QSO was completed between **W5UN** and **ZS6WB**. What sets this one apart from many previous QSOs was the low power and small antenna used on the South African end which truly shows that EME operation is possible for anyone willing to go to the effort and lose some sleep.

The output power used at ZS6WB was only **50** watts and the antenna a small **7 element Yagi** with a 2.75 metre boom length and a height of only 5 metres above the ground. The **JT44** digital mode was used during the contact. W5UN's comment at the end of the QSO was "Congratulations on being the smallest (by far) station ever worked on 2 meter eme".

Dave had previously worked W7MEM on 144 MHz CW EME who was using only 25 watts output with an antenna array of four long Yagis. Taking into account the differences in antenna gain and power W7MEM would have had a loop gain advantage in excess of 17 db, a huge amount in EME terms and another demonstration of how K1JT with his WSJT software has revolutionized weak signal VHF operation.

The moon was only four days past apogee at a distance of more than 390000 km from earth and the **15600 kilometres per watt** covered should certainly qualify this as a good QRP QSO."

November Article on JT44 (reprinted by popular demand!)

I have been playing with the JT44 software now for about a month and have found it to be the best weak signal mode so far, and this includes CW.

You have to be able to hear CW to use it, but with JT44, due to its digital signal processing, it pulls signals right out of the noise! You can get a solid copy from signals that you cannot even perceive are there!

This technology is the closest thing to magic I have seen so far!

It is slow in nature but it gets the message through when the going gets rough!

Jason (N4DSL) and I about a month ago spent some time learning how to send messages with JT44. David Tanks, (AD4TJ) gave a presentation at the October VARA meeting on WSJT software.

During the 432 MHz sprint I was able to work Joe Taylor, (W1JT), who wrote the program via JT44 mode. We keep cutting our power from 400 watts to 100 to 10 watts with good copy. At the end I switched out the power slug on my Byrd Watt Meter so I could go lower, down to about a single watt! Joe in NJ still copied me well over 200 miles away. Not bad on UHF!

For example, there is that famous kind of contest you routinely find raging at MARA & VARA meetings about how to use, or not use, the club's treasury surplus. In that type of contest -- whose name rhymes with "missing" -- there is real competition.

But the kind of contest I'm talking about has no competitors. It is where you and some other hams go up to some mountain location, telling your wife that you will be working a ham radio contest all day and not to expect you back until late. And on that date, hundreds of other hams around the world are doing the same thing.

Now to be honest, you are not fooling her. She knows good and well that you have thousands of dollars worth of equipment down-stairs in the shack. She also knows that the equipment down there, plus the huge tower and expensive beam and all those ugly-looking wires you have filling up the back yard, can outperform anything that you might pretend to erect on a Saturday morning way out in the national forest somewhere. No, if you were really going to compete with someone involving ham radio, you would stay home. She knows that. So do you.

No, no, she knows very well that what you are really doing is the activity non-hams call "going out with the boys".

In fact, I've been on contest outings where no one even remembered to bring a radio. Those have turned out to be some of the best ham radio contests I've ever participated in. Of course, no one ever admits that there was no radio. "Yeah, the bands were really open this weekend. As a group, we got over a hundred multipliers in less than ten hours." What you don't say is that "multiplier" is a euphemism for "deer tick".

A Real Crappie (not crappy) Antenna — by Howard Zehr, N9AHQ

"Are you going to use this for fishing or ham radio?" asked the sporting goods salesman. "I'm a fisherman," I said, "but this is for ham radio."
"Well," he said, "I've sold lots of these, and I haven't sold one yet for fishing."

Obviously I'm not the first to use a telescoping crappie pole for amateur radio. However, the applications I've seen have been for portable verticals such as Nor-Cal's St. Louis Vertical (www.norcalqrp.com). With 2 ½ watts, I figured I could use something more efficient than a vertical. Besides, I didn't like the idea of messing with all those radials that a vertical requires.

What I had been searching for was a relatively efficient, very portable antenna for my QRP rig. I found the solution in Nor-Cal's short doublet. After almost beaning a neighboring camper while throwing a line over a tree to suspend the antenna, though, I knew I also needed a portable, self-supporting structure. Be-

sides, I rarely seem to find a tree in the right place.

What follows, then, is a short doublet or center-fed Zepp supported in an inverted V formation by three telescoping fiberglass fishing poles. They are lightweight, collapse to less than four feet, and even have an eyelet at the end to attach the wires.

I've long been a fan of parallel-fed doublets or Zepps; in fact, an 80M-length Zepp is my primary low-band antenna at the home QTH. They are multi-band, have very little loss in the feedline and for portable use, the lead is less bulky than coax – and especially with the feed lines used here: zip cord or twinlead. The only downside is that a tuner is required. However QRP tuners can be so tiny that they hardly take up any space at all; the Nor-Cal BLT (Balanced Line Tuner) that I use is only about 4x3x1.5", has a built-in SWR indicator, tunes easily, and only costs \$29. Besides, in its clear box it's downright cute.

For the antenna and feed, one option is to use a 50' role of small speaker wire (I use 24AWG from Radio Shack) or 2-conductor computer cable. Measure off 22 feet, and mark this point. Take a brass snap swivel (fishing equipment again!), thread a small cable tie through the eye and around the wire at the 22-foot point, then pull it tight. This will be the suspension point for the center of your doublet.

Now split the 22-foot end of the wire. This will give you two 22-foot radiators for each side of your 44-foot doublet. The remainder is your feedline. This should give you basically the same basic antenna pattern on all bands, 10-40M.

If it makes you feel better, you can use 28' of twinlead for your feedline combined with two 22-foot radiators. I have one with each type of feedline and they both work, but I haven't made any comparisons.

Terminate the two

radiators with snap swivels and the antenna is done. You can roll it on a small reel, throw it in the bag with your rig, and you are ready to roll.

If you don't want to be dependent upon finding a suitable tree, however, you can take your own supports – and use them as walking sticks as you hike to your destination.

South Bend's "Sunny Day" (SD-20) 20-foot telescoping crappie pole makes a great center support; these may be hard to find locally but are available by mail order (\$20 plus shipping) through the internet. Two of Zebco's 10-foot telescoping crappie poles (about \$6 from Walmart) hold up the ends. You can clip the snap swivels to the eyelets conveniently placed on the tip of these poles.

To anchor the poles, use tent stakes (long steel spikes with green plastic tops, available from Walmart). For use with the two end poles, trim the protrusions of the

(Continued from page 8) so that the plastic ends just slip inside the larger or bottom end of the poles. To carry them, unscrew the cap and insert the stakes, point first, into the pole, then replace the cap. In use, you hammer the stakes into the ground, then set the pole over them.

For the center pole, remove the plastic part from the stake, then cut a wood block so that it just fits snuggly inside the pole. Drill a hole through the wood block so that it can

slipped onto the stake in place of the plastic part that you removed. Driven into the ground, this stake will support the center pole although for additional stability you may want to also anchor it several feet up against your picnic table or tent.

To erect the antenna, extend the center pole, then clip the center snap swivel to the top of the pole. I'd suggest you use a wire tie or Velcro strip to hold the lead-in against the pole about a foot or two below the top, and perhaps again a bit

farther down. This takes some of the weight off the top and keeps the tip from bending so much. Drive the stake in the ground, then set the pole over it

Extend the two end poles, attach the end snap swivels, then set them up at an angle away from the center pole, again driving the stakes into the ground and setting the poles over them.

Hook the lead-in to the tuner, twirl a couple of knobs, and you're on the air with an antenna that's a lot more efficient and versatile than most of the antennas commonly available for portable use. Take along some string, a hook and a couple of worms and when the band drops out, you can always go fishing.

I am indebted for the basic doublet instructions to Jerry Parker, WA6OWR, from Nor-Cal (drawing in part from an article in *World Radio* by Cecil Moore, W6RCA).

Summary of Ham Radio Telephone Interconnects Now Available in the Valley

There are several ways you can patch your 2-meter or dual-bander FM radio into the telephone system.

For access to Harrisonburg telephone numbers (including Grottoes, Elkton, Bergton, Broadway, Timberville, Bridgewater, and Weyers Cave) you can access the WN4JMU phone patch on the 145.13 repeater. Subscription is \$15 per year for unlimited calls, and comes with two speed-dial numbers of your choice. For more information, contact David Fordham, KD9LA, telephone 540-234-0448 (evenings) or 540-568-3024 (daytime).

For access to Harrisonburg phone numbers on the 440 MHZ band, you can use the 444.775 MHz repeater. Subscription is \$25 per year for unlimited calls, and comes with two speeddial numbers. Additionally, subscribers to this system have access to "in-dial" reverse autopatch. Reverse patch allows your non-ham family members to call you from their telephone to your ham radio. This system also allows long-distance calling-card calls. For more information, contact Jason Armentrout, N4DSL, at 540-269-8141.

For access to Waynesboro, Fishersville, Stuarts Draft, and Staunton area telephone numbers, the 147.075 reepater has an autopatch. Subscription is \$30 per year for unlimited calls. Also, as an additional benefit, subscribers to this system will likely be given the control codes (once the system is thoroughly tested) for the EchoLink system described in the article on page 2. Reports on KD4RD and W4XD

"Every dog needs a friend that can write for him so here is a Dalmatian that can write for you."


