Directions to the 2015 Field Day site start at the sharp turn on Rt. 42 exactly 3 miles south of Bridgewater. Proceeding south from Bridgewater you will turn right at this sharp turn. If you are coming north on Rt. 42 from Churchville you will see a sign with flashing yellow lights on it just before you turn left on Rt. 747.

Go west on Rt. 747/613 towards Mt. Solon. Just follow the main road. After 3.4 miles you will come to a 4-way stop at Mt. Solon – continue straight ahead following the main paved road. The road number will change from 747 to 730 but just follow the main road and you will probably not even notice the number change. After a 3-way stop, you will come to a one lane steel bridge - You Have Arrived. Turn left up the drive by the yellow house just Before you cross the bridge.

Note that when you leave the site, immediately after getting back on the paved road at the bridge, the main road BEARS RIGHT to take you back through Mt. Solon to Rt. 42. Remember Bear Right!!



Luray Invaded!

The Page County Annual Bicycle Race had begun!

The cyclists had been separated into three groups, and by 0730, began escaping into the surrounding area, being led and followed by the Sheriff's Deputies. A prescribed course had been reserved for them to frolic in. By 1100, they had succeeded in completing four laps. After a break for food and refreshments, they were off and riding again! Three different groups started the afternoon festivities. One group completing five laps, the second group completing six laps and the third group seven laps by 1500.

The sweep rider, referred to as "The Backward Rider" made a final sweep to insure no riders disappeared into the surrounding countryside. The Page County Rescue Squad was in attendance to assist with any emergencies.

With six checkpoints manned by the ARES group, no riders were lost.

Amateur Radio support for the MMT-100 Foot Race



This race is very well organized and supported, with many volunteer hours required to host such a first class event. Kevin Sayers was race director and volunteer coordinator and Larry Miller KB6VAA coordinated our amateur radio support as well as serving as Net Control along with others.

It was very enjoyable to support this event and witness the outpouring of support by runners for their comrades on the Massanutten Mountain trails.

test. Special Events going on: the 100th anniversary of the sinking of the Lusitania; on the 9th is the Inaugural Special Event celebrating the 150th anniversary of the last shot fired in the Civil War; also on the 9th is the Armed Forces Day Special Event from the USS Midway Museum Ship Radio Room; the 23rd is the 50th anniversary of the Chesapeake Maritime Museum.

As Ed McGuire is going to take the test in June, we discussed whether to take his check for the club dues, as any new ham gets his membership free, or give it back to him(with the presumption that he will earn his license); we gave the check back.

Nothing has been heard from the Bike Festival director, so we know nothing of their plans yet.

May 7, 2015

Meeting called to order at Wood Grill, Harrisonburg, by President **Gerald Nauman, KN4FM**, at 7:31 p.m. 18 members and 6 guests were present. Introductions were made all around.

New Members: An application for **MARA** membership was received from **Bob Hume, W4DMV**, with a first reading.

The Secretary's Minutes for last month's meeting were approved as published in the April *Monitor*.

The Treasurer's Report for May was approved as published in the April *Monitor*.

Committee Reports:

ARES: Bryan Daniels, K4RMY, reported that the Mountain Valley Emergency Communications Group now meets on the last Sunday of the month at 1830 local time, on or close to 7.189 MHz. Active members are from Rockingham, Page, Warren and Shenandoah (?) Counties. As reported in the April Monitor, the next face-to-face meeting will be May 30, 3 p.m., but the location was not mentioned at this MARA meeting, if known.

Following the 40 meter SSB net, the Page County **ARES** net meets on the 146.625 repeater.

Repeaters: No report

<u>Volunteer Examiner (VE) Committee</u>: Next session will be 9:00 a.m. Saturday, June 13, at Woodmen of the World, Dayton.

<u>Public Service</u>: David Collins, N4WDC, reported that the Orkney Springs horse ride on Saturday, June 13 needs 6 ham stations to provide communications for its one-day event. For more details, email N4DWC@arrl.net. It was also reported that there is a National MS Society bike ride in Purcellville on the same Saturday. It was noted that these events are on the same day as the VE session.

Announcements: David Collins, N4WDC, discussed the MFJ Cub QRP kit and some available QRP books, as well as MARA tee shirts. He suggested the club consider using the MARA logo designed by Andrew Pearson, N4RCE, on the tee shirt, and place orders for any or all of these items. A motion was made and passed, that the club should look into MARA apparel.

Old Business: Herb Slade, AA2BF, reported that most plans for Field Day are well in hand.

We will not have a GOTA station this year, but **Ray Ritchie, K4NRA**, and **Matt Huffman, KD4UPL**, plan to operate the VHF/UHF station again.

One important detail needs to be



settled: After initial hope that the old Field Day site near Flagpole would be accessible at last, we learned that the area will not be open to any vehicular traffic until the Forest Service has repaired damage done by thoughtless people in four wheelers chewing up the mud. After that has been done, access will be by permit only. At the time of this **MARA** meeting, we were still talking to the Frontier Culture Museum about having the FD site on a large field on its property. The next FD committee meeting will be Wednesday, 6/3, 6:00 p.m., at Mt. Crawford Burger King.

New Business: Representative Bob Goodlatte is supporting H.R. 1301, which would direct the FCC to extend "reasonable accommodation" of amateur radio to private land use such as where C&C rules apply to permitted structures. The **MARA** Secretary was directed to write Mr. Goodlatte a letter under our club letterhead, thanking him for his important support for amateur radio.

50/50 Drawing: \$22 collected, with \$11.00 won by **Foster Farone, WF40**, who donated his share to the club. \$22 will go to the **MARA** Treasury.

Motion to adjourn: Passed at 8:30 p.m.

Program: A HT Show & Tell session followed Adjournment. It was mentioned that GMRS radios, as opposed to FRS types, must be licensed. Several members discussed old or new favorite HTs, including Andrew Pearson's Yaesu 4T60 dual bander, Bryan Daniel's ICOM T90A (which receives from 90kHZ -999MHZ!), John Bottemiller's 1985 2-m single bander, and Ray Ritchie's Yaesu 530(?). There were no hand-held spark-gap transmitters at this S&T. (Just checking to see who reads the whole Secretary's minutes:).

Amateur Radio in Play in Aftermath of Nepal Earthquake

At least one HF net is reported to be handling emergency and relief-related traffic in the wake of a devastating and deadly earthquake in Central Nepal. The magnitude 7.9 quake on April 25 caused landslides on Mount Everest during the climbing season, killing an unknown number of mountaineers and stranding others. A strong aftershock hit April 26. So far, some 2200 people are reported dead. The earthquake hit an area between the capital city of Kathmandu and the city of Pokhara. An emergency net has been running around the clock on 20 meters (14.205 and/or 14.215 MHz), with Jayu Bhide, VU2JAU/AT150ITU, as net control station and other stations in India participating). The net has been attempting to organize relief logistics. Amateur Radio DX.com also has reported activity on 7.100, 18.160 and 21.360 MHz.

Running just 25 W from solar power, Satish Kharel, 9N1AA, was reported to be coordinating his activity with Nepal police and sharing duty with Suresh Up-


reti, 9N1HA. Both are in Kathmandu. Amir Bazak, 4X6TT, in Israel joined the net and helped to keep the frequency clear. "Our stations are working with no break," said Bhide, who is Amateur Radio Society of India (ARSI) National Coordinator for Disaster Communication.

Nepal's first Amateur Radio repeater, set up in 2012 by the National Society for Earthquake Technology (NSET), and at least a dozen ham in various locations were reported on VHF. The 9N1KS repeater (434.500 MHz in/145.000 MHz out) is on the NSET headquarters building on the outskirts of Kathmandu. A drill conducted in 2012 indicated good coverage of the Kathmandu Valley.

The US chapter of the Computer Association of Nepal provided technical and financial assistance for the repeater and supplied equipment to use it. The repeater has a battery back-up power source.

The NGO "Humanity Road" is maintaining an updated summary of damage as well as immediate needs.

The Phillips Code

It was one of those great "AHA!" moments. Circulating around the Internet as "Only great minds can read this " floated across my screen. You may have seen it:

"fi yuo cna raed tihs, yuo hvae a sgtrane mnid ... "

Of course I could read the scrambled and garbled text. Then came comprehension. A great light dawned in this Old Timer's CW consciousness. This little exercise from some researchers at Cambridge University reveals the secret of copying highspeed CW plain text. That is, the CW op doesn't need ALL the letters in a word to recognize it, much less in correct order — just enough letters (initial and terminal) to fit it to its context for a fully transcribed text. I have known and marveled at highspeed ops who could copy plain-text English 60-65 WPM. I personally clocked one at 68 WPM, the highest setting we could get on a Boehme keyer. Awesome.

I knew that such high speed ops had to slow down significantly to receive and transcribe five-letter cipher groups. Such coded texts preclude subliminal recognition of content; every letter has to be accounted for individually – there is no "context" of meaning in raw cipher traffic. So the 60 WPM high speed press op, for example, had to brake down to 35-40 WPM to handle five-letter code groups. Many high speed ops could comfortably copy press ten to twenty words behind transmission. No problem remembering context and meaning as the plaintext words flow across the page. (I've known and seen shipboard ops copy press for the ship's newspaper directly on mimeograph stencils.)

Copying five-letter code groups behind is tougher. There is no "meaning" to recall while pounding the mill. Although I have friends who could copy four or five groups behind (i.e, 20-25 characters), the best I could do in my salad days was one to two groups (or five to ten letters) behind. Years later, a psychology prof explained this exhibited a typical short-term memory "bin" of the mind. That's why we can easily recall 7-digit telephone numbers but have difficulty with the 10-digit ones or commercial 9-digit zip codes.

Wait – there's more! More than a century ago telegraphy was our only mechanism for transmitting news and mes-

sages across the land. Electricity beat out the Pony Express in just one year when the trans- continental railroad came along in 1867. The telegraph flourished with avidly sought-after sports and political news, all usually charged at a unit cost-per-character. High speed telegraphers (such as Thomas Edison) made bundles of money for Western Union, Postal Tele- graph and other companies producing hand-written messages at speeds of up to 30-35 WPM. Exactly as the 20th century's high speed radiotelegraphers could do with plaintext press as noted above.

In 1879 Walter J. Phillips developed a "telegraphic short-hand" to speed up transmission times and economize on per-character cost. Mr Phillips' code embodied one to four letter abbreviations for roughly 10,000 common English words. (Did you know your own English storage bin recognizes about ten times that number?) In Phillips Code, for example, "MST HV IMT AR TO OU TGM O YA" is written out as "Must have immediate answer to our telegram of yesterday" – a saving of 49% of per-character charges, and a freeing up of 33% more available circuit capacity.

By century's end (1900) the Phillips code was in common use by skilled telegraphers across the land. When typewriters came into general use, telegraphers knowing Phillips Code abbreviations would directly transcribe text into plain language as heard on the sounder. Although telegraphic and radio circuits were advanced with the machinery of 20th century electro-mechanical technology (e.g. teletype, ticker tape), brass-pounding old timers still used it through WW-2 on both military radio and LL circuits if they found a knowledgeable partner on the other end and the text was unclassified plain English.

Morse telegraphy, including HF CW, has indeed faded away into a dim and distant past. Phillips Code itself occupies a small niche in the annals of American communications technology.

Yet we as amateur radio operators occasionally using CW Morse code on the air employ some vestiges of this long-forgotten Phillips Code: ES for "and" and TT for "that." Two from ten thousand is a tiny remainder and minuscule percentage indeed, but maybe as with the South, Mr Phillips' English language code Will Rise Again!


