Burial was in the Lindale Mennonite Church Cemetery. Vernon served as an engineer with the Westinghouse Corporation in Verona, Virginia, and in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Personal Message Handling on the DX Cluster

(Now that we have another DX cluster gateway on Afton mountain, it might be a good time to review some of the system's messaging capabilities. The messaging system is intended for short, brief, personal messages between users, and is not a substitute for a packet BBS system.)

Command: DIRECTORY This command is used to display a list of the current mail messages on the PacketCluster node to which you are connected. A hyphen (-) next to a particular mail message number indicates that the message has been read by the station to which it was addressed, a plus sign (+) indicates message set to noauto_delete, an asterisk (*) indicates both read and noauto_delete, and a "p" indicates a private message. If you specify a call on the command, you will see messages only sent by or to that station.

Syntax: DIRectory callsign

DIRectory/ALL (Displays all active mail messages. By default, only the five most-recent messages, or all since your last use of the DIRECTORY command (whichever is greater) will be displayed.

DIRectory/BULLETIN Displays mail messages addressed to ALL.

DIRectory/NEW (Displays all mail messages which have been sent since your last use of the DIRECTORY command.)

DIRectory/OWN (Displays mail messages which are addressed to you or were sent by you.

DIRectory/SUBJ text Displays mail messages which have the specified text in the subject, e.g. DIR/SUBJ DX.

DIRectory/nn Displays the nn most-recent mail messages.

Command: READ This command is used to read a mail message which is shown in the DIRECTORY display. A READ without a message number will read the oldest unread mail message addressed to you. Any mail message may be read if the message number is specified on the READ command.

Syntax: READ

READ message-#

READ/NOPAGE message-#

ARRL Bulletin Summaries

Bulletin #14, February 28th: Ex-ARRL Director and Wife Killed in Robbery -- Well-known contester and DX'er Floyd Teetson, W5MUG, and his wife Winnie, WN5YTR, were found murdered, apparently during a home robbery attempt, in Heflin Louisiana on February 23rd. (ARRL Special Bulletin #8, issued March 22nd, announced that an arrest had been made by law enforcement authorities.)

Bulletin #15, March 1st: FCC Drops VE Conflict of Interest Rules -- The FCC formally deleted the provision of the VE program which prohibits publishers and commercial marketers of ham license material and study guides from serving as VE's and VEC's. The FCC said that other checks and balances of the VE program were sufficient to prevent fraudulent testing, and the change was being made in accordance with the deregulation requirements of the Telecommunications Reform Act.

Bulletin # 16, March 14th: NY Section Changes -- Effective April 1, 1996, the New York counties of Herkimer and Otsego will move from the Northern NY ARRL section to the Western NY section, in accordance with the voting by hams in those counties.

Bulletin #17, March 15th: FCC Callsign Update -- The latest callsigns issued in the 4th call district were AE4RF, KT4LS, and KF4HFX. In the 8th district the most recent calls were AA8WE, KG8VV, and KC8CON.

Bulletin #18, March 22nd: East NY Section Manager Appointed -- Due to several leadership changes in the

ARRL organization, a new SM had to be appointed to fulfill the term left by a "promoted" SM.

Public Service May Be the Only Way to Save the Ham Bands

Those of you who have been keeping up with the on-line ham forums, newlines, and NetNews have probably been surprised to learn that, for the first time ever, the Congressional hearings on spectrum auctions this spring included the ham bands!

In the past, the ARRL has been successful in keeping the ham radio spectrum out of the auction process, knowing full well that hams can not afford to compete with business interests for valuable spectrum space. This time, however, the ham bands were included in the opening hearings, in spite of a vigorous effort on the part of the ARRL.

Fortunately, however, a number of public service organizations came forward to our defense, and it looks very likely that the ham bands will be taken out of the auction process, if they haven't already by the time you read this. But the problem is far from solved.

Yes, it is true that the American Red Cross, the Salvation Army, the National Weather Service, FEMA, and numerous other agencies stood up for us this time. But this was only because we have served them well in the past. If we hams curtail our volunteer service to these organizations, they will have absolutely no reason to come to our defense in the future.

With VHF and UHF spectrum selling for millions of dollars per megahertz (in the case of some upper UHF spectrum, hundreds of millions per megahertz), no rational person could ever advocate leaving over a hundred megahertz (our current VHF/UHF spectrum) out of the auction process for mere "hobby" use. It is only because of the important societal function we offer to the American public that our bands were not sold for half-a-billion dollars to people who claim to make much better use of them than do "mere hobbyists".

Hams offer "free" communications support for safety (such as the MS Walks, and the Bike Virginia activities), activity coordination (such as the First Night events), traffic control (such as the Bridgewater Lawn Parties), emergency assistance (such as the ARES responses to the floods and blizzards), and weather reporting (the Skywarn activities), among others. If we were not to offer these services, we would not be able to enjoy the rag-chews, the packet networks, DX clusters, nets, APRS, or other enjoyable aspects of the hobby.

In other words, ham radio is not a free hobby. We must "pay" for our use of the spectrum. If you enjoy contesting, rag-chewing, packeteering, and other aspects of the hobby, then you owe it to all of us to come out and help with the public service events.

There is plenty of opportunity here in the valley for you, (yes, you!) to help pay your way for using what has become a scarce national resource: the radio spectrum.

Sign up for ARES and become a trained emergency-support communicator. Or, attend the Skywarn training sessions and then participate in the Skywarn nets. Or, come out to the MS walks, the races, the bike tours, the First Night events, the lawn parties, and the other community activities which need communications support. Or, help teach a novice or tech class. Help with the Volunteer Examiner program. Assist with the demonstrations of ham radio in the public schools. Support the BSA Jamboree-on-the-Air in October.

These are just a few of the many ways that hams in the valley are doing their part. The question is, are you doing yours? If you are not participating in the above activities (or ones like them), then just what are you doing to reimburse the American people for the resource you are occupying?

Only by continued public service will hams be able to continue to enjoy the spectrum we now have. Merely "filling up" the spectrum with repeaters, contests, and packet links will be insufficient to hang on to our scarce spectrum space if Congress is pushed to get the most out of the available air space.

In spite of their well-earned criticism, Congress does (sometimes) take the public good into account. If hams stop serving the public, there is no doubt that Congress will give our megahertz to someone who will serve the public, and rightly so.

The Big Mountain Repeater Association, sponsor of the 146.625 repeater, has set Sunday, August 18th as the date for their annual "Bob's Knob Bash". The annual event features a fantastic picnic, complete with live music and entertainment. The menu will be the same fantastic fare as in past years. The event is free, and is open to the entire ham radio community. Mark your calendar!

SkyWarn Volunteers: Get Ready for Summer

As summer approaches, the SkyWarn organization turns its attention away from snowfall reporting and concentrates on severe thunderstorm and wind activity. Heavy rainfall, over 1 inch in an hours' time or over 3 inches across 12 hours, is cause for concern and activation of the SkyWarn nets.

It is suggested that you prepare your station for summer SkyWarn service before the coming of the storm season. Below is a checklist of things that might need your attention.

Lightning Protection: Loosen your grounding clamp and connections, wire-brush away the corrosion, and reconnect everything tightly. Double-check your lightning arrestors to make sure they haven't blown. Check the electrical continuity all the way from the antenna to the ground rod.

Emergency Power: check the liquid level in your backup lead-acid batteries. Remember to never use a power supply line that is not properly fused. Check for over-rated fuses (fuses rated at an amperage higher than that which the wiring can safely carry).

Weather Equipment: Check your rain gauge. If you left yours out during the winter, it may be cracked. Be sure your thermometer won't be in the direct sunlight. Calibrate your barometer at least once a year. (If you live near the Shenandoah Valley Regional Airport in Weyers Cave, you can use the barometric pressure reported continuously on 124.925 Mhz AM as a calibrator.)

Antennas: Make sure that snow and ice have not loosened your antennas, that water has not seeped into your feedlines, and that your station can withstand the winds and rains.

Emergency Rations: Check the shelf-life and expiration date of the food and medicines in your family and personal emergency response kits. Change the water in your emergency water jugs.

Other supplies: Check the batteries in your flashlights. Keep your gas can full at all times. Refill your car gas tank when it drops below halfway. And above all, have an emergency plan for your family -- where to meet and regroup if you are separated, whom to contact in emergencies, and how to get hold of relatives.

VARA Treasurer's Report

I thought I'd start this month's report with a summary of last year's income and expenses. In 1995, the VARA club brought in \$355 in dues, \$161 from the 50/50 drawings, and \$275 from donations (including the Bike-Virginia donation). Major expenses included \$382 for the newsletter, \$71 for non-newsletter postage (including \$58 for the post-office box rent), \$223 for field-day expenses (including \$185 for the VARA portion of the broken beam replacement), \$113 for Christmas Party expenses, and about \$100 for other miscellaneous expenses. All numbers were rounded to the nearest whole dollar. Our expenses last year exceeded our income somewhat, but due to last-minute deposits by the Treasurer before Christi, our balance actually increased. So far as I know, none of these funds is reserved for any particular purpose.

When I took over the books, we had a beginning balance of \$822.25. As reported at our last meeting, I have received \$445 in dues and \$10 in donations, and expended \$22.90 for newsletter postage in January and February, \$32 for stamps, and \$22.90 for flowers. This left an ending balance of \$1193.47.

Since the meeting, and through March 21st, I have received \$20 in dues, and \$10 in 50/50 drawing income (\$9.50 was reported at the meeting, but an extra \$0.50 was found later), and expended \$27.78 for March printing and postage on the newsletter. This leaves a balance of \$1195.69.

Unless there are objections, I intend to make all future Treasurer's Reports here in the newsletter instead of taking up time at the meetings. As always, I remain available to explain any questions you may have about the club income or expenses.

Jeff showed a videotape of an actual HF net in progress passing traffic.
